**Total Hours** 120<sup>1</sup> A minimum grade of C is required in all major, cognate or minor courses, and designated supporting courses.<sup>2</sup> Fifteen credit hours of history, including senior seminar, applied toward graduation must be awarded by USC Upstate.<sup>3</sup> History majors must complete HIST U300 Introduction to Historical Studies with a minimum grade of C and complete a total of 12 hours of upper level courses with a grade of C or better prior to enrolling in HIST U500 Senior Seminar.<sup>4</sup> Course content must match region.

<sup>5</sup> One three-credit course in DEI is required. Completion of a course that satisfies both a Regional and the DEI requirement provides an extra Elective Course Option (12 credits instead of 9).

<sup>6</sup> Subject matter must focus on diverse or marginalized people.
